Here We Stand, United: OVU Begins Process to Become Affirming Church

"Affirming Ministries provide information, acceptance, support and justice-making for people of all sexual orientations and gender identities and for people exploring their place on the spectrum of human sexuality. These ministries declare, in words and actions, that God loves and celebrates all people. And they call upon the rest of the church and society to do the same.

Through a process of discernment and reflection, Affirming Ministries discover what it means to be inclusive and justice-seeking. They prepare a statement of faith and vision that sets out their ongoing commitment to work for justice on issues of gender diversity and sexual orientation within their congregation, the wider church, and their community, and to support and participate in the Affirming Ministries Program." Your OVUC Affirming Committee first met in April 2019 after

receiving approval to proceed from Council, followed by congregational approval at the March 2019 AGM.

Eight of us have met regularly and worked diligently over the intervening



months to understand and appreciate the scope of the process we have undertaken. We are making every effort to educate ourselves so that we can become strong

allies and advocates for the 2SLGBTQ+ community. We are reminded of Orchard Valley's Mission "to deepen our spiritual understanding and reach out to others through worship and socially just action." To provide a safe space for all.

The Committee recently had an afternoon educational session facilitated by the Valley Youth Project that covered Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation. We may have a follow-up session: Creating Safer Spaces for 2SLGBTQ+ Communities.

Early next year, we will be hosting a workshop for all interested members of the congregation. The workshop will focus on the role and significance of scripture in discussions of sexual orientation and gender identity.

We are on an exciting and challenging journey together towards inclusivity in our "open hearted" welcome and in our worship.

Facilities Committee Seeks Feedback on Initial Design

November 27 marked the sixth meeting between your Facilities Committee and the design architect, Cory McFadden of B. D. Stevens Ltd. Each meeting to date has made substantial progress toward an initial presentation to the congregation on Dec. 8. A short presentation will be made after the early service, with the major presentation scheduled for after the 11am service. The Committee, comprised of Carolyn Cameron, Jim Dewar, Cynthia Bruce, Helen Seymour, Harvey Gilmour, Don Sellsted and Council Chair Jane McDonald, will be alongside Cory to answer questions.

The Committee began its work over a year ago by incorporating the work of a previous committee that surveyed the congregation about future building location and functional priority hopes/expectations.

The four design pillars arising from their work, and upon which discussions have since been based, reflect clear priorities

of music, Sunday school/youth, kitchen, and structural and sanctuary size and flexibility. As those in attendance on Dec. 8 will see, a sanctuary designed for up to 200 people, expandable to 250 for special occasions and through membership growth, is possible through expansion. The footprint of the building will nearly double by extending it southeasterly into the Quality Concrete property to be gifted by B. D. Stevens Ltd.

Early financial parameters will be available for the basic design thus far, with major decisions lying ahead regarding environmental leadership, landscaping,

equipment and interior options.

At this point, the Committee offers this initial design for information and asks for comment. The complete "package" will come to the congregation at a later date and then, further, will require approval of the UCC Region 15.

We are also cognizant of the opportunity we have to integrate, where possible, items in storage from our predecessor buildings. On behalf of the Facilities Committee, I want to thank the congregation for its patience and support to date. I hope you are as excited as we are about the future of our Church and about these plans.
