4.1 Susan Cater, Outgoing Chair, Church Council

Love to you all.

Once we are proficient in these three, we can develop skills to build effective relationships across experiences. It's important to me that this occurs within our church family and in the wider community.

During my year as chair, I have become concerned that we are stuck in an anchoring bias as to what the church must be, a beautiful sanctuary and space for our own use.

I have bias due to my past experiences with the church. I often recognize my power and privilege. I work hard to be an ally, making a conscious effort to better understand the struggle of others, moving I hope, closer to socially just action.

My passion lies in outreach. This is where I believe growth and unwavering purpose will protect the United Church presence on the Valley floor, what we do not what we have. I wish the Council all the best as you continue the work of the church. I love my Orchard Valley family and I hope to return to the Outreach Committee where my vision and belief of church as a movement, faith as an action, is more obtainable.

4.2 Minister's Annual Report 2021

Greetings and peace to you all again this year. I will begin with a confession – I have really struggled to write to you this year as the lyrics to the Herman's Hermits song, "I'm Henry VIII, I Am", running through my mind with "second verse, same as the first..." One of the many things that has repeated itself in 2021 was the spirit, commitment, and generosity of our faith community.

2021 did indeed echo a lot of what we saw in 2020. But throughout this past year, we kept going, kept in touch, kept worshipping, kept praying, kept adapting, kept growing, and kept learning. These six months have been educational, affirming and filled to the brim with blessings. I cannot begin to express my gratitude to OVUC for adopting me as part of this big beautiful family. I've settled into my new home happily and can't wait to share with you all that has happened this year.

Children and Youth Program

This year with the help of Christian Development, we have built our kid's programs after COVID held us back for quite some time. We have shifted our Sunday School program to a program called Voyagers, an all-ages exploration class of faith, the Bible, and our relationships with God. We've got a number of children enrolled in our Voyagers program and we had new faces showing up each week to the point where we now need multiple classes! The Santa Claus breakfast was not just a time for our mystery friends to meet but also a time for many of our families to come together and get to know one another and meet Santa! A big thank you to Congregational Life for making the event such a success.

Sadly shortly after we had to shut down due to increase in COVID cases, however, we were undaunted and ready to move forward virtually and through other methods that keep everyone safe!

Worship

I've been fortunate to lead worship independently a few times as Don was on vacation for a short period this summer and for the occasional Sunday as well. It has been a wonderful experience getting to work with the many gifted folks here at OVUC and sharing in worship with each of you.

We had three big worship services this year that our kids and youth got to participate in. We first had Children's Sunday where the kids and I lead worship. We were so proud of our youth for standing up in front of the congregation for the first time since the pandemic and leading!

Next, we did our play for White Gift Sunday. I wrote the play last year titled "A Covid Carol" based on the story by Charles Dickens with a modern twist! With the help of a couple of adults and nine of our kids and youth, we put on a play that highlighted showing compassion even when things are tough!

To end the year we filmed our nativity play to send out to the congregation virtually! Due to Covid, things were definitely a challenge, but in the end, we put together an awesome play! A big thank you to all

the adults and kids who came together to make an awesome play.

Education

When I first started at OVUC, I was on study leave for the remainder of the semester as I continue to works towards obtaining my Master of Divinity (MDiv). The summer was extremely busy as I took three intensive courses, United Church Worship, Intro to New Testament Greek, and Preaching Foundations. I passed all with flying colours and had a short break before beginning my fall courses. This fall I was enrolled in United Church History and Supervised Ministry Placement. I passed both of these courses as well and begin United Church Foundations and Supervised Ministry Placement again, in the New Year, finally completing all my introlevel courses for my MDiv. My Supervised Ministry Placement will continue for the next four years here at OVUC. I have course work to go with this course as well as learning goals to work towards with my Lay Supervision team. I am grateful to my LST team from OVUC who have been a major support this year during my schooling.

<u>Closing</u>

I'd like to start my closing by thanking every person who has helped out with our children and youth this year; you make a difference in aiding the next generation and helping them navigate their blossoming faith.

I opened with courage and I have to tell you everything we have done this year has taken courage. We stand together with the courage to come together again, and the courage to stay apart again. I saw beautiful courage in our youth for showing up and leading worship, bringing friends, and living life joyfully. The Affirming Committee has had a very busy and productive year. The great news is that the Eastern Canada United Church Affirming Coordinator has accepted the **Enhanced Vision and Mission Statements, the Inclusive Marriage Policy, and the post AGM Action Plan.** This means that the Committee can present a motion at the 2022 AGM to apply to be designated as an Affirming Church. (The cost is \$100.00/year from the Affirming Committee budget).

As an inclusive community of faith, we actively seek to live our Mission by:

In June, the Committee members participated in a Pride Sunday Service.

Two Affirming Banners are nearing completion. One is **"Every Bunny is Welcome Here"** and the second is a rainbow **AFFIRMING** banner with lots of affirming words.

A copy of the **Inclusive Bible** was donated to OVUC to be used where appropriate. Books and other resources are continually being added to the Affirm Library available at the Church Office.

The Committee made a \$100.00 donation to the Valley Youth Project for additional library resources. (Under the umbrella of the Lesbian Gay and Bisexual Youth Project in Halifax).

The Committee has developed a budget for 2022 that has been submitted to Bill Simpson.

We have submitted an article to the Christmas Advent Newsletter.

We plan to purchase a Rainbow Bench for the Church in the spring from the Flower Cart.

We are very excited that we will be able to ask the congregation for permission to apply to Affirm United to be designated as an Affirming Church. If accepted, the Committee will begin work on the long-range action plan.

This Committee works to provide stewardship of Orchard Valley's Christian development programs and to determine the educational and developmental needs of the congregation and initiate programs to meet these needs. This has been challenging with COVID and some programs such as the Lectionary Group have yet to resume since the pandemic began.

Grace Marcoux and Andy led the junior youth group until the spring lockdown. The group had a successful sponsorship campaign for their walk in Kentville that included a tour of Open Arms and the OATS thrift shop. Another toque sale, thanks to Valerie Mosher sand Heather, and the sponsorship campaign raised \$1,270 for Open Arms. The monthly family worship went until the spring lockdown: many thanks to Ken Hassell, Thea Burton, Sylvia Jacquard and Grace Marcoux for their leadership and support. Cheryl, Heather and Andy provided

card materials for a monthly kindness project; Andy made faith-at-home kits with Theresa Perrin's help, for Pentecost, Thea Burton's cupcakes. In lieu of monthly family worship during the spring lockdown, we had a Zoom coffee time, a Zoom Pentecost gathering and an in-person blessing of the animals at Willow Park in Wolfville. We sent one child and two youth to Sherbrooke Lake Camp and three families to Kingswood Camp. We are grateful for the congregation's donations towards camp sponsorships. Don had a movie night in response to the possible human remains detected at various residential schools.

We were very excited and pleased to welcome Katie, our new Youth and Families Minister! We held special youth group meetings and a parents' meeting for her. In the fall, she began leading the Sunday School and youth group plus initiated new programs such as Kids Hang Out (a monthly children's event), Mystery Friends (a pen-pal program), and a Santa breakfast, the latter with Congregational Life. Katie made take- home kits for Advent that more families asked for than before. She involved children and youth in the Children's Sunday worship, the White Gift worship and the Christmas Eve pageant; thanks to all the adults who participated in the pageant especially Thea Burton who codirected it. Thanks as well to our other Sunday School teachers: Heather, Andy and Johanna Rosolen. We have not only seen growth already in the number of children and youth coming to our programs but also growth in the interconnectedness between them and the rest of the congregation. Hip, hip, hooray to Katie and the Search Committee!

Finally, a big thank you to Sylvia Jacquard and her student assistants who have been cataloguing the church books! We look forward to launching Orchard Valley's library in the renovated building!

General Purpose:

The Covenanter is the oldest existing Presbyterian Church building in Canada and is an object of great pride to the local community. It is a registered Provincial Heritage Building and a National Historic Site and as such, is an active tourist destination for local, national and international travellers. Because of its historical importance the Committee would like the Covenanter to remain a living church by maintaining ties with the United Church of Canada.

Currently the responsibility and a trust of the Orchard Valley United Church, the Covenanter has unique and independent sources of funding and management. The Covenanter Church is a trust of Orchard Valley United Church trustees and is managed by the Covenanter Committee. The Committee has representation from OVUC Trustees, community members, the OVUC minister as well as OVUC church members. The church has been financially self sufficient through the Heritage Fund set up to receive and disperse monies for repairs and maintenance. Funding is from a variety of sources including offerings, donations, weddings, fundraising, bequests, memorials and government grants.

Highlights:

During 2021 the Covenanter Committee has lost a very valued member in Dorothy Robbins who left quite a gap in the committee's decision making and at church

events where her presence was well known and felt. Also, Harvey Gilmour whose sound and sage advice as the Board of Trustees representative to the committee, will be missed and finally John Burdock, the former chair of the Covenanter Committee, has relocated to the Pictou area for his work and thus stepped down.

Many of our committee meetings were held virtually on Zoom and five were held as in person meetings at OVUC in 2021.

The proper care and maintenance of the Covenanter is always a priority of the Committee and OVUC Trustees and so thanks to Greg Allen (lawn maintenance) and Heather McKinley (custodian) for their service to the Covenanter.

Ongoing fundraisers for the Covenanter include sales of Winds of Change, a history of the peoples of the Covenanter Church in Grand Pré; sales of "A Joyful Noise", a CD of early 1800 hymns, by Millennium Friends, an a cappella choir; handpainted note cards with seasonal scenes of the Covenanter and the sale of the Grand Pré Cookbook, compiled by the former Lower Horton UCW.

Even though services this year at the Covenanter have been curtailed because of COVID-19 there have been two wedding services take place with strict COVID protocols in place. Unfortunately Covenanter's visitors have not been able to physically enter the building but a virtual tour is possible through the OVUC website, where a pano view of the interior is available. Rev. Don Sellsted produced virtual Easter and Christmas Eve services which included members of the Covenanter Committee. The response to these services was very positive from many congregants of OVUC and the public as well.

Special meetings this year included the annual inspection by the Building and Fire Inspector's Office of the church; an ad hoc committee meeting to discuss the types of replacement roofing and another to consider quotes and decide on this roofing (decision considered not just the lowest quote but the one that would give longevity and durability to the roof in years to come); and a meeting with the Church's insurance provider to upgrade the current policy.

The Covenanter Committee's goals for 2022, with an approved budget include: to continue ongoing maintenance and projects for the Covenanter; to replace the material on the roof and steeple of the church; to consider repairing or replacing the round window in the tower; to initiate conversation/ ideas for fundraising for the Covenanter and to finalize the Committee's Vision and Mission Statement which will be incorporated with that of Orchard Valley United Church.

5.9 Outreach Committee

The effects of COVID-19 continued to be felt on some of the Outreach programs of Orchard Valley. Again unable to take place in 2021 were: Canucopia, the Clothing Swap and Give Away, Highland View Seniors Apartment Complex Social Program and Meet Your Feet (except for one clinic in December). A few programs, like the Christmas Hamper Program and the annual Scholarships were able to take place as usual and a few others took place partially or in a modified form.

Benevolent Fund: It has been a relatively busy year for the benevolent work of the Outreach Committee. The phone line is checked most days and calls are returned, normally the same day.

We assisted those in need with food, power, phone, money for medications and furnace oil.

Christmas Hamper Program: Orchard Valley United Church assisted with Christmas Hampers in Wolfville, New Minas, Kentville and surrounding areas. In Canning, we contributed \$500.00 to The Canning Interchurch Council to assist their families in need. In Wolfville, our contribution was \$500.00 toward pies and turkeys distributed throughout the Wolfville and Area Interchurch Council. The salvation Army co-ordinates the Hamper program for the Kentville and Area Council of Churches. Various churches participated from this area helping families in need. Children were helped under the toy store part of the program with OVUC providing approximately \$2,500.00 in toys for the store. OVUC provided coordinators, registration, delivery and toy store workers. We delivered 41 Christmas Gift Card hampers to families in this area. In total 512 children and 469 families were helped at Christmas. A special "Thank You" to all volunteers and for your very generous support. (Helen Seymour & Sheila Fisher, co-ordinators)

Food Bank: Fundy Food bank served 4,922 clients (3,302 adults/1,620 children) in 2021. Orchard Valley United Church donated a total of 339kg. All home deliveries at the food bank are being delivered by the Kentville Rotary Club drivers. Our numbers are down in 2021 compared to the previous year but in December the numbers are starting to rise once more. (Sue Smith)

Meet Your Feet Foot care Clinics: The program was restarted on December 21 at the County Fair Mall. It was unable to continue at Orchard Valley because it required a space with no carpet. The space needed some work so the Friday Morning Breakfast Group and the Men's Group each donated \$1000.00 which was used for new flooring and repainting (which was done by the Men's Group). It is a great location because it is central for clients on the bus route and all of the equipment and supplies are able to be in one space. We had 35 clients with four nurses and three volunteers. It was very well received and free will offering was a plus. We hope to start up again in March as long as the COVID numbers come down. (Cheryl Manzer)

Glooscap Elementary School Breakfast Program: The Glooscap Breakfast Program was able to re-start at the beginning of 2021-2022 school year. We were asked to provide two volunteers each morning for four weeks. Volunteers did two of the scheduled weeks (Sept. 27-Oct.1; Nov 22-26) before COVID restrictions closed the schools to volunteers. (Sylvia Jacquard, Co-ordinator)

Low Income Families: We continue to provide support in different ways to a number of low income families. I am grateful again for all the advice the committee gave me regarding these families. (Andy Pitter)

Scholarship Program: The five- member Scholarship Committee administers the \$1000.00 Rev. Dr. K.G. Sullivan Scholarship and the \$500.00 Arthur R. Allen Scholarships on behalf of the congregation. This year we received 19 applications from the three high schools in our catchment area (Central Kings

Rural High School, Horton High School and Northeast Kings Education Centre) and the students chosen were Anna Syme and Sarah Stockdale, both from Horton. WE would especially like to thank Theresa for all of her work in redacting any identifying information in the applications so committee members are able to choose the winners based solely on merit, without the influence of any other factors. 5.10 Pastoral Care Committee

The Orchard valley United Church Pastoral Care Committee, in partnership with the Ministry team, coordinated pastoral care visitation to members of the congregation (and other United Church of Canada people living in our communities). The Pastoral Care Committee encouraged and supported Orchard valley United Church home, hospital, and institution visitations, while providing a nurturing environment for both the visiting volunteers and those being visited.

The 2021 Pastoral Care Committee membership included Rev. Don Sellsted, Admin Assistant Jean Millett, Vange Leslie, Vera Burke, Noreen MacGregor, Edie Lloyd, Allyson Dunfee, George Dunfee, Linda Draper, Jan Porter, and Joy Waterbury (Chair). All members have the requirements for the Duty to Care Program.

The committee met monthly except for the summer months and December either in person or by Zoom. The meetings all started with a meditation and ended with a blessing and prayer circle. We reported to the OVUC Council and attended the Council meetings. Bills for expenses were forwarded to Council for payment from the 2021 Budget.

COVID restrictions have limited Point-to-Point and Cab transportation for members to be brought to church.

Nursing Home Services to seniors were on Zoom for the Wolfville Nursing Home. Committee members have provided assistance when needed. Bulletins and cards were sent, telephone calls were made, funerals were attended where possible and e-mails were sent. Hospital visiting was limited to Rev. Sellsted.

<u>The Journeying Through Grief</u> books (four short books set) are available for committee members to share with Orchard Valley United Church at four crucial times during the first year after a loss.

Pastoral Care's two sub-committees were Prayer Shawls and Spirit Yoga met when COVID restrictions allowed. There were a total of 25 Prayer Shawls or Prayer Squares given out this year. Yarn and patterns are available at the church for those who prefer to work at home.

Rev Don, Katie Logan, Ken Hassell and our Pastoral Care committee hosted a virtual Longest Night Service, December 21st.

A program called "You've Got a Friend" (to help OVUC Church members to keep in touch with each other) was organized by Vera Burke, Linda Draper and Allyson Dunfee. Thank-you to our callers: Lois Tracy, Judy Gilmore, Jan Porter, Jean Millett, Edie Lloyd, Eleanor and Ned Chase, Linda Draper, Peggy Jones, Anne Clattenburg, Fran Turner, Betty Rockwell, Joy Waterbury, Margaret Curry, George and Allyson Dunfee, Cheryl Manzer and Gloria Hick. This group effort was especially important this year to support and prevent loneliness for church isolated members.

We wish to thank those Church members who donated cards, stamps, time and money for our OVUC Pastoral care work throughout 2021. Linda Draper has sent 291+ cards this year!

Partnership with our clergy team is essential for Pastoral Care. Rev Don Sellsted participated in meetings. For this, we are very grateful. Thank you to our OVUC Administrative Assistant and Rev. Don.

We are forever grateful to all of those caring prayers, energy and innovative OVUC people who have stepped up to the challenge of keeping our church family connected this year.

WAICC churches provided worship to the Wolfville Nursing Home via Zoom for the first part of the year, and for a couple of months they made DVDs of this worship for the Elms. In September, in-person worship resumed at both seniors' residences but then was suspended again mid-December.

Clergy led weeknight Biblical reflections via Zoom for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity followed by an in-person Sunday afternoon worship hosted by Wolfville Baptist, with the preacher being Father John MacPherson from Corpus Christi, the regional Roman Catholic parish St Francis belongs to. Due to the spring lockdown, WAICC made a video for the annual Good Friday walk-with-the-cross and held their AGM via Zoom. The latter included a presentation focused on Black Nova Scotian athletes with guests from Horton High School's Africentric Cohort and Hockey Nova Scotia's Diversity and Inclusion Task Force.

6.6 Kentville, New Minas and Area Council of Churches

Due to the Covid-19 virus and Omicron variant, the Council of Churches did not meet in 2021.

Ecumenical Worship

Christian Unity Worship – No service was held

Blessing of the Grads/Family Picnic – Was planned and hosted by Northeast Kings Education Centre in June

Advent Service – No service was held.

Valley Foodgrains Bank – Various fund- raising activities were cut back this year due to the Covid-19 virus. One church participated in the sale of pumpkins – Kentville Baptist Church Youth group raised \$1,308.75.

Fundy Food Bank – The Kentville Rotary Group provided drivers for the 230 weekly deliveries for clients who had medical issues, elderly, etc. Our numbers on the average were down throughout the year but now we are starting to see a rise in the last couple of months. The food bank served a total of 4,922 clients (3,302 adults/ 1,620 children) this past year. Orchard Valley donated 339 kg food items to the food bank.

Christmas Hamper & Good Neighbour Energy Home Heating Programs are administered by the local Salvation Army. In 2021, 469 Christmas Hampers and 512 bags of children's toys were distributed through various churches in the area. OV provided 41 Christmas Hampers and \$2,500 worth of toys. The Good neighbour Energy Home heating Program is for clients who need financial assistance with their heat and funds are provided by NS Power.

6.7 Valley Foodgrains Bank Project

The Valley Foodgrains Bank Project (VFGBP) has been a multi-faith and community project since its inception. The VFGBP works under the direction of the Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFGB)

The CFGB is a partnership of fifteen churches and church-based agencies working to end global hunger by supporting international programs to meet immediate food needs, reduce malnutrition, and achieve sustainable food security; influencing improvements in national and international policies that contribute to ending global hunger and increasing and deepening the engagement of Canadians to end global hunger.
